#### Barb L. Butler (Regina)

A survivor of an acquired brain injury, Barb Butler's perseverance has impacted both survivors and caregivers. She was the first survivor to be elected president of the board of directors for the Saskatchewan Brain Injury Association, and currently serves as the president of the Brain Injury Association Canada. An accomplished educator, she served as president of the Wilfred Hunt Home and School Association and the Jack McKenzie Parents Advisory Committee. Her connection with the community and those she serves both on the provincial and national level has been a source of hope and inspiration. Other contributions include:

# Maisie Hanna (Regina)

Believing in the value of traditional arts, Maisie Hanna, formerly of Meyronne, has dedicated more than 60 years of service with the goal of improving the well-being of rural Saskatchewan women. Her passion for fibre arts, her love of literacy and her determination to raise money for Third World projects has connected women of all ages and backgrounds and promoted Saskatchewan's history. She served as president of the Saskatchewan Women's Institute, Winnabel Branch and inspired them to purchase two water pumps, a treadle sewing machine and a bicycle for a Zimbabwe village; she crocheted a Victory Shawl for jailed women in South Korea, and made a mascot encouraging students to fundraise for the Clean Water Project. Through her doll collection she fundraised for the *Save the Sight for Children*. Her accomplishments include:

Saskatoon businessman Ted Merriman's sense of moral purpose rooted in social justice was the seed that flourished as he helped those who were less fortunate. As Founding Member of Care and Share Saskatoon, he initiated and has sustained more than 15 recreational and social programs for students in community schools and for under-privileged and at-risk families. He established the Dignity Fund whereby finances were made available to buy items some people take for granted. He served a hot Christmas lunch to 250 children at an inner city school. Impressed with the reaction he received, he approached the Canadian Progress Club and the following year 5,000 kids received a hot meal. His service to his province includes:

Margaret Sandison has been an active member of Skate Canada – Saskatchewan for more than 60 years and continues to this day to contribute at provincial events. As Canada's representative at the international level for more than 25 years, she served as judge, technical representative, official and team leader. She has been a mentor to many officials. She is one of Saskatchewan's 19 Gold Level Judges in all disciplines. Both founder and co-ordinator of a skating program developed for persons with intellectual disabilities, she also gives generously of her time to her church, the Regina General Hospital Auxiliary and Gift Shop, Government House and Souls Harbour Mission. # Walter A. Thiessen (posthumous) (Saskatoon)

Saskatoon musician and teacher Walter Thiessen spent over 60 years working with musical, cultural and heritage volunteer organizations. He served as president of the Saskatchewan Registered Music Teachers' Association (Provincial and Saskatoon branch), of the Musical Art Club, and of Gustin/Trounce Heritage Committee Inc. With the latter organization, he played a central role in restoring the Dr. Lyell Gustin Residence, now a designated Provincial Heritage Property in Saskatoon. He led church music for decades as pianist/organist and choirmaster. Like his musical mentor, Lyell Gustin, Mr. Thiessen was an ardent supporter of young musicians, an advocate for culture and the arts, plus an inspiration to the community. His influence continues far and wide through many former students who have taken up professional music careers or who carry music with them as a lifetime gift. His contributions included:

- Creation and organization of the Lyell Gustin Memorial Piano Competition for advanced-level young pianists from across the province

- Piano adjudication for the Saskatchewan Music Festival Association
- Performing recitals, solo and with other artists, for the Saskatchewan Arts Board
- Conducting annual Christmas carol concerts at First Mennonite Church, Saskatoon, and organizing mass choir festivals for the Saskatchewan Mennonite Church
- Serving on an editorial board to create and publish a unique and original German-language hymnbook
- Developing a Church Music Library that is publicly available
- Supporting Saskatoon musical organizations symphony, opera and choirs through attendance, engagement and contribution
- Assisting fellow teachers to prepare young musicians for examinations with the Royal Conservatory of Music of Toronto, and Trinity College of London, England
