## Ministry of Health/Saskatchewan Health Authority Response to Ombudsman's Recommendations - August 5, 2021

Four of the recommendations of the August 5, 2021 report, "Caring in Crisis: An investigation into the response to the COVID-19 outbreak at Extendicare Parkside" were specific to the Saskatchewan Health Authority. All recommendations have been accepted and the first steps of implementation have begun.

Recommendation	Response
The Saskatchewan Health Authority immediately stop the practice of having four special-care home residents share a bedroom.	All four bed rooms were converted to semi-private (two beds per room) rooms by March 31, 2021 and capacity limits have been changed accordingly. The conversion from four-bed rooms to two-bed rooms is permanent.
The Saskatchewan Health Authority update its standard written agreement (Principles and Services Agreement) for special-care home operators without delay, and ensure all operators it enters into agreements with to provide services are required to comply with care-related policies, standards and practices, including infection prevention and control measures, that are acceptable to the Authority.	The SHA has been working to update the Principles and Services Agreement for several months.  The SHA will work with its affiliated and contracted long-term care providers, and with the support of the Ministry of Health, to include the applicable ombudsman's recommendations in an updated Principles and Services Agreement.
The Saskatchewan Health Authority establish and implement a detailed annual review and reporting process to ensure that all special-care homes in Saskatchewan are following all required care-related policies, standards and practices, including infection prevention and control measures, and that it publicize information about each home's level of compliance at least annually.	Government will implement a new compliance review and inspection process for all long-term care facilities in 2021-22.  Government has tasked the SHA and the Ministry of Health to work with all partners to strengthen the outbreak planning policies and processes going forward.
The Saskatchewan Health Authority ensure its communicable disease prevention and control management standards and practices are consistently applied in all special-care homes in Saskatchewan, including completing comprehensive infection prevention and control inspections of all special-care homes at least annually.	Government will implement a new compliance review and inspection process for long-term care facilities in 2021-22.  The SHA and Ministry of Health will work with all partners to strengthen broader infection control requirements which will including outbreak response processes.
